[15] Emerson encourages his readers to understand that self-reliance is "freedom in a spiritual universe that is just as rule-governed as the Newtonian physical universe". [15] Cladis explains that individuals are not expected to endure life alone; achieving self-reliance is understanding that "we are surrounded by helps and aids of all kinds, supporting us, sustaining us, journeying always with us."
